Promoting Mental Health and Wellness	1.Continue the practice of Christian Meditation while also introducing new prayer experiences. Promotion of Healthy Schools Culture with the continuation of Healthy Schools committee, the creation of a student led Wellness Group, and the November 19-23 "Building Stronger Titans" Week. Grade 9 Boy/Girl Retreats in September to assist student in the transition to high school. Offer Grade 8 orientation programs for our family of schools that help our grade 8 students to better prepare themselves to enter the high school community. Offer opportunities to assist in grade 8 transition to high school such as the Ready Set Go Program, Reach Ahead Summer credits, and Tech Exploration Days. Offer programs to support academically disengaged students to support academic success through Alternative Education, Supervised Alternative Learning, and Home Instruction.	Open discussions will take place with staff, exploring increased mental wellness of students as a means of using classroom & school presentations and Christian Mediation. Capacity Building	1.Ensure that potentially high-risk behaviour of students is properly assessed and supported.	Provide ongoing training for all principals and other relevant staff in the area of Violent Threat Risk Assessment Protocol and other pertinent training (e.g., Trauma Response Education training, NVCI, SAFE TALK and ASIST Training) on an as needed basis or by request. Student Success Team meet weekly to ensure student engagement, support, and sense of belonging to the community. Ensure students are aware of services available at school (i.e. School Social Worker, Health Nurse, Addictions Counsellor, etc.).	Continue to offer and train select personnel (Principals, SERTs, teachers, and support staff) with Threat Risk Assessment and NVCI Training on an as needed basis or by request. Continue to offer and train select personnel (SERTs, teachers, and support staff) with SAFE TALK and ASIST Training on an as needed basis or by request. Students who are having suicidal ideation and self-harm will be connected to help. Administrators and other trained staff will state an increased comfort and ability to support students/schools in times of crisis.
	2.Become better informed to the legalization of recreational cannabis across the district.	Participate in the CAMH 2019 Ontario Student Drug Use and Health Survey. Introduce and educate school administrators and staff to promote safe and healthy school communities in relation to recent legalization of recreational cannabis.	Students will understand the impact of early cannabis use. Youth are prevented from starting to use cannabis and there will be no evidence of use of cannabis on school property and at school sanctioned events. Continued support is provided in cases where use is problematic.
	3.Implement online training (SAFESCHOOLS Training) to address safe schools issues (bullying, abuse, harassment & discrimination).	SAFESCHOOLS online training, including bullying recognition and response will be accessible for completion by all BHNCDSB employees during the 2018-2019 school year.	Staff at all levels within the district will acknowledge more understanding and comfort in regard to issues surrounding safe schools. More consistent approaches and practices will be practiced across the district.
